ORDINANCE NO. 2023-08

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF DENNIS ESTABLISHING ARTICLE II, CHAPTER 144 OF THE DENNIS TOWNSHIP CODE, TEMPORARY STRUCTURES

WHEREAS, Township of Dennis, a township form of government, is governed by statutes, specifically N.J.S.A. 40A:63-1, et seq. that allow the Township Committee to pass, adopt, amend and repeal any ordinance or, where permitted, any resolution for any purpose required for the government of the municipality or for the accomplishment of any public purpose for which the municipality is authorized to act under general law;

WHEREAS, Article II of the Revised General Ordinances of the Township of Dennis is silent as to the parameters of temporary structures erected on commercial or residential properties;

WHEREAS, the Township Committee believes it desirable, and in the best interest of the Township and its citizens to establish a new Chapter within Article II to ensure the health and safety and reasonable enjoyment of one's property for all residents of Dennis Township by providing requirements and time limits for temporary structures;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Township Committee of the Township of Dennis, County of Cape May, State of New Jersey as follows:

Section 1. Article II, Chapter 144 of the Township of Dennis Municipal Code is hereby established and shall read as follows:

Chapter 144. TEMPORARY STRUCTURES

§144-1. Purpose.

The purpose of this chapter is to ensure the health and safety and reasonable enjoyment of one's property for all residents of the Township of Dennis by providing requirements and time limits on temporary structures erected on commercial or residential property located within the confines of the Township.

This Chapter is not intended to regulate licensed campgrounds pursuant to Chapter 75 of the Township of Dennis Municipal Code.

§144-2. Definitions.

ATTRACTIVE NUISANCE

A public or private condition that would constitute a nuisance according to the laws of the state and/or Township ordinance, and specifically including, but not limited to, the following:

- 1. Any open, unsecured, or unsupervised temporary structure fond to be an attraction to trespassers shall be deemed to be an attractive nuisance.
- 2. Any temporary structure that has defective or unsanitary plumbing facilities or defective electrical equipment.
- 3. Any temporary structure considered to be a fire hazard or is otherwise unsafe or unsecured so as to endanger life, limb or property.
- 4. Any temporary structure that is in need of repair or is in a state of dilapidation, decay, faulty construction, vacant or abandoned, damage by fire, in danger of collapse or failure, or otherwise dangerous to anyone on or near the premises.

TEMPORARY STRUCTURE

Structures utilized on a short-term, seasonal or intermittent basis, such as tents, canopies, membrane structures or similar structures without a permanent foundation and not classified as a premanufactured garden-type utility shed in accordance with the New Jersey Uniform Construction Code. Children's play tents and equipment or other leisure seasonal canopies not used for storage or habitation are exclude from the requirements of this chapter.

TENT

A structure, enclosure or shelter constructed of fabric or pliable material supported by any manner except by air or the contents that it protects, with sidewalls or drops on more than twenty-five (25) percent of the perimeter.

CANOPY

A structure or architectural projection of rigid construction over which a covering is attached that provides weather protection, identity or decoration, and may be structurally independent or supported by attachment to a building on one end and by not less than one stanchion on the outer end.

MEMBRANE STRUCTURE.

An air-inflated, air-supported, cable or frame-covered structure not otherwise defined as a tent or canopy.

§144-3. Setbacks; structural requirements.

All temporary structures including but not limited to tents, canopies, and membrane structures erected or located in any zone adjacent to or on any commercial or residential properties shall be subject to the following requirements:

A. Setbacks and general requirements.

- 1. No temporary structure shall be erected on any property, in any zone, where there is not already an existing principal structure for which a certificate of occupancy has been issued.
- 2. Temporary structure(s) in any zone shall be not permitted within a front yard and only within a side yard or rear yard that does not about a public right-of-way with the exception of an alley.
- 3. Temporary structures in any zone may not be sited within six (6) feet of any side or rear property line except on waterfront lots where they may be sited up to the bay front, lagoon front, or ocean scarp line. All measurements shall be taken from the furthest projection or overhang.
- 4. Temporary structures in the rear yard which abut an alley and are used as a garage with its access from the roadway shall be set back fifteen (15) feet from the rear or side property line which abuts the roadway. All measurements shall be taken from the furthest projection or overhang.

B. Additional structural requirements and dimensions.

- 1. All temporary structures including but not limited to tents, tension membrane and formed or rolled extruded aluminum or steel structures shall be adequately anchored to the ground in accordance with the New Jersey Uniform Construction Code where applicable. Temporary structures shall not exceed fifteen (15) feet in height if detached from the main structure.
- 2. Temporary structures including but not limited to tents, canopies, and membrane structures may be erected for use only as a temporary building. They may not be utilized for habitation.
- 3. All tents, canopies, and temporary structures generally must be constructed of approved fire-retardant fabric or material and so marked.
- 4. Gasoline, gas, charcoal or other cooking devices or any other unapproved open flame shall not be permitted inside or located within twenty (20) feet of any temporary structure.
- 5. Any temporary structure in excess of nine hundred (900) square feet or with a side dimension greater than thirty (30) lineal feet shall not be permitted.
- 6. Temporary structures will not be permitted if the structure(s) create an attractive nuisance or pose any other threat to the health, safety and/or well-being of the community.

§144-4. Time Limitations and Removal.

No temporary structure shall remain for longer than seven (7) days in a one-hundred-eighty (180) day period before being removed. All such temporary structures shall be removed from the property no later than the expiration of the seven (7)-day time period.

§144-5. Violations and Penalties.

Violations of this chapter shall be punished by a fine not exceeding \$2,000.00 or by imprisonment in the county jail not exceeding ninety (90) days or by ninety (90) days of community service, or any combination thereof. Each day that any violation shall continue shall constitute a separate offense. Whenever any such fine shall be imposed upon any corporation, such fine and costs and charges incident thereto may be collected by an action of debt or in such other manner as may be provided by law.

- Section 2. All other ordinances in conflict or inconsistent with this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict or inconsistency.
- **Section 3.** Should any section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance be declared unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, the remaining portions of this Ordinance shall not be affected thereby and shall remain in full force and effect, and to this end the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be severable.
- **Section 4.** This Ordinance shall take effect in the time and manner prescribed by law.

ORDINANCE NO. 2023-09

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF DENNIS AMENDING ARTICLE II, CHAPTER 128 OF THE DENNIS TOWNSHIP CODE, LOITERING, GOOD ORDER, AND PEACE

WHEREAS, Township of Dennis, a township form of government, is governed by statutes, specifically N.J.S.A. 40A:63-1, et seq. that allow the Township Committee to pass, adopt, amend and repeal any ordinance or, where permitted, any resolution for any purpose required for the government of the municipality or for the accomplishment of any public purpose for which the municipality is authorized to act under general law;

WHEREAS, Article II, Chapter 128 of the Revised General Ordinances of the Township of Dennis currently outlines the certain types of loitering prohibited within the confines the Township of Dennis;

WHEREAS, the Township Committee believes it desirable, and in the best interest of the Township and its citizens to expand the aforementioned Chapter to address the need for good order in peace within the Township;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Township Committee of the Township of Dennis, County of Cape May, State of New Jersey as follows:

Section 1. Portions of Chapter 128 of the Township of Dennis Municipal Code are amended as follows (additions are underlined; deletions are [bracketed]):

Chapter 128. Loitering, Good Order, and Peace

ARTICLE 1

§ 128-1. Definitions.

As used in this chapter.

LOITERING

Remaining idle or walking aimlessly about in essentially one location.

PARENT or GUARDIAN

Any adult person having care or custody of a minor, whether by reason of blood relationship, the order of any court or otherwise.

PUBLIC PLACE

A place to which the public has access and shall include any public building and grounds, street, boardwalk or sidewalk. It shall also include the front or neighborhood of a store, shop, restaurant, tavern or other place of business, and public grounds, areas, parks and marinas, as well as parking lots or other vacant private property not owned by or under the control of the person charged with violating this section or in the case of a minor, not owned or under the control of his parent or guardian.

QUASI-PUBLIC PLACE

Private or publicly owned property utilized for proprietary or business uses which invites patronage by the public or which invites public ingress and egress.

§ 128-2. Certain Types of Loitering Prohibited.

No person shall loiter in a public or quasi-public place in such a manner as to:

- A. Obstruct the free passage of pedestrians or vehicles.
- B. Obstruct, molest or interfere with any person lawfully in a public <u>or quasi-public</u> place. This section shall include the making of unsolicited remarks of an offensive, disgusting or insulting nature or which are calculated to annoy or disturb the person to, or in whose hearing, they are made.

§ 128-3. Violation.

Any person violating the provisions of this chapter shall be ordered to move on by a police officer, constable or other law enforcement officer and failing which shall be guilty of a violation of this chapter.

§ 128-4. Loitering by minors; notice; presumption.

The parent or guardian of a minor under the age of 18 years shall knowingly permit that minor to loiter in violation of this chapter. Whenever any minor under the age of 18 years is charged with a violation of this chapter, his parent or guardian shall be notified of this fact. If at any time within 30 days following the giving of notice, the minor to whom such notice relates again violates this chapter, it shall be presumed in the absence of evidence to the contrary that the minor did so with the knowledge and permission of his parent or guardian.

§ 128-5. Penalty.

Any person violating the terms or provisions of this <u>Article I of Chapter 128</u> for a first offense shall be liable for a fine of up to \$500, incarceration in the Cape May County Jail for a period not to exceed 30 days and ordered to perform community service for a period of time not to exceed 100 hours.

§ 128-6. Observance of lawful orders and posted traffic regulations.

No person shall disobey or fail to follow the order, direction or other signal of any police officer, sheriff's deputy, New Jersey State Trooper, constable or other properly authorized law enforcement official within the Township; nor shall any persons disobey or fail to follow the traffic instructions on any properly posted traffic control device or traffic signal within the Township.

ARTICLE II - GOOD ORDER AND PEACE

§ 128-7. Obstruction.

- A. No person shall intentionally obstruct pedestrian or vehicular traffic upon the public streets, public sidewalks, public pavilions, public parks or other public places. Acts authorized as an exercise of one's Constitutional right to picket or legally protest and acts authorized by a permit issued pursuant to the Code of the Township of Dennis shall not constitute obstruction of pedestrian or vehicular traffic.
- B. No person shall sleep in or on any public or quasi-public street, sidewalk, pavilion, park or other place so as to obstruct or interfere with the passage of any person or persons lawfully being on or upon said streets, sidewalks, pavilions, parks or places.
- C. It shall be unlawful to sleep in any parked vehicle, either day or night, within the Township limits or to sleep or lie upon any public or quasi-public bench or seat or to usurp the use of such bench or seat for the storage of bundles or other objects so as to prevent the reasonable use thereof by others.
- D. No person shall loiter on governmentally owned property within the confines of the Township of Dennis between the hours of between the hours of 10:00 p.m. to sunrise except for unusual and unforeseen emergencies, township sponsored activities, and/or otherwise approved by Township Committee.

§ 128-8. Illegal entry.

It shall be unlawful and illegal to enter, without legitimate and reasonable errand or business, upon any private property, hotel, rooming house, lodging place or other place of public accommodation, and not having previously obtained express or implied permission of the owner or person in lawful control and possession of such places above described, to make use of the furniture, showers, toilets or other like facilities there installed, or wander or roam about the premises.

§ 128-9. Disturbing good order and peace.

A. <u>It shall be unlawful and offensive conduct for any individual, either alone, or in the company of others, to revel, quarrel, brawl, disport or behave in a</u>

noisy, boisterous manner, emitting loud cries and other noises, or jostling those about them, or causing inconveniences to those about them, or to otherwise disrupt and disturb the public peace and dignity, in any public or quasi-public place, public rights-of-way, public sidewalk, public park, or in any building open for the accommodation of the public for entertainment, or for room accommodations.

B. It shall be unlawful and offensive to enter upon any public or quasi-public place or private property without the consent of the owner or person in lawful control and possession thereof and to there picnic, change apparel, dress or undress or to urinate or defecate upon the premises or commit any other nuisance.

§ 128-10. Violations and penalties.

Any person of association or persons convicted of a violation of any provision of this Article II of Chapter 128 shall, upon conviction thereof, be subject to a fine not exceeding \$2,000 or 90 days imprisonment in the City or county jail, or for a period of community service not exceeding 90 days, or any combination of the three.

- **Section 2.** All other ordinances in conflict or inconsistent with this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict or inconsistency.
- Section 3. Should any section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance be declared unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, the remaining portions of this Ordinance shall not be affected thereby and shall remain in full force and effect, and to this end the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be severable.
- **Section 4.** This Ordinance shall take effect within twenty (20) days of final passage and publication, as provided by law.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF DENNIS AUTHORIZING THE SALE OF CERTAIN PROPERTY OWNED BY THE TOWNSHIP OF DENNIS, COUNTY OF CAPE MAY, NEW JERSEY, NOT REQUIRED FOR PUBLIC PURPOSES PURSUANT TO N.J.S.A. 40A:12-13, et seq.

WHEREAS, the Township of Dennis is the owner of certain real property designated as Block 69, Lot 17 on the tax map of the Township of Dennis, commonly known as 646 Petersburg Road, Dennis Township, New Jersey, (hereinafter referred to as "subject property" or "property"), not needed for public use, and the Mayor and Committee have determined that it is in the best interest of the Township to sell by open public sale at auction to the highest bidder to generate revenue, reduce taxes and liabilities; and

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 40A:12-13, et seq., the Local Lands and Buildings Laws, a municipality may sell any real property, not needed for public use, by open public sale at auction to the highest bidder after advertisement thereof in a newspaper circulating in the municipality in which the land is situated, by two insertions at least once a week during two consecutive weeks, the last publication to not be earlier than seven days prior to such sale; and

WHEREAS, despite being an undersized lot, the property has capital improvements contained thereon which allows the Township to proceed with the sale via a public auction pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40:12-13(a).

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Mayor and Township Committee of the Township of Dennis in the County of Cape May, State of New Jersey, as follows:

<u>Section 1</u>. The Mayor of the Township of Dennis and other necessary Township Officials are hereby authorized to enter into a public sale of the Property owned by the Township in accordance with N.J.S.A. 12-13(a) and take all reasonable, necessary and lawful steps to effectuate the sale of the property, including execution of the appropriate deed and transfer documents.

<u>Section 2</u>. The Township shall advertise the sale of the Property in a newspaper circulating in the Township by two insertions at least once a week during two consecutive weeks, the last publication to be not earlier than seven days prior to such sale.

<u>Section 3</u>. The property sale shall be subject to the following terms:

A. Bids shall be accepted electronically by GovDeals.com until Wednesday December 6, 2023, at 4:00 p.m. EST.

- B. Minimum bid price of \$60,000.00.
- C. The bid must be accompanied by a deposit made payable to the Township of Dennis in the form of cash, bank check, or cashier's check in the amount of 20% of the total bid. No representation is made by the Township as to the utility, usability or environmental condition of the Property, except as otherwise set forth herein, including but not limited to the presence or absence of wetlands.
- E. The deed given by the Township to the Property will be a Quitclaim Deed. No title contingencies or conditions are permitted.
- F. The sale shall be subject to adjournment or cancellation by the Township Committee.
- G. The sale shall be subject to restrictions of record and local ordinances.
- H. The Township Committee reserves the right to reject all bids.
- I. It is understood that the Acquisition is subject to applicable New Jersey law concerning disposition of municipal real estate.

<u>Section 4</u>. In the event that any portion of this Ordinance is found to be invalid for any reason by any court of competent jurisdiction, such judgment shall be limited in its effect only to that portion of the Ordinance actually adjudged to be invalid, and the remaining portions of this Ordinance shall be deemed severable therefrom and shall not be affected.

<u>Section 5.</u> All ordinances or parts of ordinances deemed to be inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed.
